The subtle impact of open defecation is child stunting, gender based violence, dropout rates in schools.

We under the SHE (Sanitation, Hygiene, and Empowerment) project have recently completed the construction of 24 new toilets in schools across Chhattisgarh and Uttar Pradesh. In our pursuit to make this world a better place, we will continue to bring small changes like this!

It was the longest night for us. We were stuck in Mandi, Himachal Pradesh and nowhere else to go. My team was looking at me to take some action but I couldn't. I had to choose between serving the people or saving my team's life. I chose the latter. The dilemma continued throughout the night.

Weeks ago, we received the news that Himachal Pradesh was suffering from torrential rains and floods. We were asked to go there and set up medical camps. It was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for us. Though a small team, we took the onus to serve the people of Himachal Pradesh. Our travel was difficult in the mountains

since the roads were in bad condition. Somehow we reached Kullu and set up a medical camp there. It was heart-wrenching to see the number of people that were affected. Our next stop was Mandi. The condition there was worse. It was raining continuously for 96 hours. We didn't have time to find a perfect location for the camp. Therefore, we decided to set up the camp amidst the rain.

Our days turned into nightmares when we saw what floods had done to Mandi. The roads were completely damaged, people went missing, and homes were swept away. As if the horrors of staying weren't enough, we had to move to Shimla.

On that fateful morning, I opened Facebook and was shocked to see the videos pouring in from Shimla. Everything was crumbling down. It was then I had to choose between staying or moving. I decided to stay considering the safety of my team. An hour passed and my team came to me. I was confused looking at their faces. They looked determined and said in unison that we should move to Shimla. I was so moved by their resolution to serve mankind.

The next thing I knew, we were on our route to Shimla. After dodging damaged cliffs, walking with the mobile van for hours to see if the road was cleared, and switching drivers; we finally arrived.

It was worth it. The affected people came in numbers. Their eyes gleamed at the sight of camp. Had my team not decided to move, it would have been an injustice to these people. I realised the importance of taking calculated risks and thinking beyond ourselves. We said our goodbyes to Himachal Pradesh after a 25-day stay. And all the setbacks, victories, smiles, and tears will forever remain in our hearts.
